

UNDER WHICH CIRCUMSTANCES CAN I BE DEPORTED?

Foreigners who are in the United States can be deported if they commit certain crimes or violate the immigration laws of the country.

The following persons can be deported:

-  Migrant persons with irregular migration status
-  Persons with temporary visas
-  Permanent legal residents with Green Card or residency permit

Some of the most common infringements to the immigration law are:

-  To enter the United States illegally, even if it is the first time☒
-  Staying in the United States for longer than the time allowed by the immigration authority
-  Having a deportation order and not leaving the United States☒
-  In case you do not attend an appointment with an ICE officer, deportation in absentia can be declared
-  Infringing the visa conditions
-  Having a marriage of convenience or if you entered the country with a marriage visa and before two years time, the residence procedure by marriage ends due to a divorce or annulment
-  Finishing the conditional residency before applying for permanent residency
-  Human trafficking
-  Lying to obtain a visa or in any immigration procedure
